Grand Opening of New Regina Children's Cancer Clinic

September 13th, 2022 was a truly special day. It marked a huge improvement in the care we are able to provide to children from southern Saskatchewan undergoing cancer treatment. Hospitals of Regina Foundation welcomed Saskatchewan's Minister of Health, Paul Merriman, Greg Ottenbreit, MLA for Yorkton, Saskatchewan Health Authority board members and senior leaders, and a number of major partners in this endeavor to formally unveil the new Children's Cancer Clinic at Regina General Hospital.

Our new Clinic has been created through an intial commitment of over \$1 million by the Foundation, thanks as always to our generous donors and community. This incredible new space will provide southern Saskatchewan children suffering with cancer, and their families, with a warm and welcoming environment to receive the care they need, while being able to remain as close to home as possible. Limiting travel time, and allowing children to receive their treatment closer to home and their families' support system, is an important

part of providing them with the best care possible.

Each year 15-20 children and teens from Regina and southern Saskatchewan are diagnosed with cancer, and approximately 100 children receive treatment, monitoring or follow up care. This brand new, dedicated and child friendly cancer treatment space at Regina General Hospital will provide our medical teams with the new technology and equipment they need to provide the best cancer care possible to sick kids from across southern Saskatchewan.

Carl Gillis has had a few careers in his 80 plus years, including flying fighter jets for the Royal Canadian Air Force during the Cuban missile crisis in the 1960s. He and his wife Joan were stationed in Germany at the height of that global crisis, in 1962. Since then, they've lived and worked in Montreal, farmed near Gray, Saskatchewan and are now enjoying their retirement years in their home overlooking the scenic golf course in Avonlea, about 80 km southwest of Regina.

As Carl recalls, their love story started when he drove Joan home from a party, one evening in 1957. From there, wedding bells weren't far off, and the rest is history. He and Joan will celebrate their 61st wedding anniversary in November, 2023.

In recent years, both Carl and Joan have encountered health issues, after a lifetime of nothing more than minor illnesses. These experiences have only served to reinforce their decision to invest in local health care by becoming monthly donors to Hospitals of Regina Foundation more than ten years ago.

"We support a number of causes, but in this case, we wanted to ensure the best possible health care is available for us and for future generations, including our children (two), grandchildren (two) and now great-grandkids (four). This brand new space will allow these children and their families to receive their treatment as close to home as possible.

Pasqua Hospital's GI Unit Helps Gravelbourg Man

February 2022 is a month that 52-year old Gravelbourg resident, Ron Gall, won't soon forget. "It all started on a Sunday, when I woke up at 5 a.m. in pain," Ron explains. "I went to the local hospital, where they thought I was having a gall bladder attack. They sent me home, but I was back the next day when the pain returned."

Ron was taken, by ambulance, from Gravelbourg to the hospital in Moose Jaw but it was determined he ultimately needed to be seen by a gastrointestinal specialist. He was then transferred by ambulance to Regina's Pasqua Hospital in order to be seen in our Gastronintestinal (GI) unit.

Pasqua Hospital is home to the only dedicated GI fluoroscopy system in the province. It is a special type of imaging system that uses X-ray technology to allow our specialists to view the patient's body in real time as it moves.

Thousands of people from across the province are referred here each year, and the GI Unit uses the fluoroscopy system to help an average of 5 patients every day. Our doctors used the fluoroscopy system to look inside Ron's gall bladder and, due to the number of gall stones and other blockages, the decision was made to remove it surgically.

"I'm definitely grateful that the team at the Pasqua Hospital had such advanced technology available to them," says Ron. "On top of that, the quality of care was incredible. I was treated professionally and with dignity throughout the experience, which I certainly appreciated." Ron is well acquainted with the lifesaving care at Regina's hospitals. In 2014, he spent 17 days in a coma at Regina General Hospital after an industrial accident. His recovery from that accident also included spending almost a year at the Wascana Rehabilitation Centre, relearning how to walk and talk.

"Obviously, a person never wants to experience serious medical emergencies," Ron observes. "But if you do have to, it's a comfort to know such world-class care is available right here in southern Saskatchewan."

Today, Ron is back at home in Gravelbourg and looking forward to resuming his duties as the town's maintenance person and rink attendant.

"Ron's story simply reminds us why it's so important to invest in the priority needs of our hospitals," said Dino Sophocleous, president and CEO Hospitals of Regina Foundation. "That's why the Foundation is investing \$1.7million in a new dedicated GI fluoroscopy system and other technology for the GI Unit at Pasqua Hospital. This investment will help our medical teams to continue providing outstanding health care to our southern Saskatchewan community, but also to people from across our province."



Regina Man Receives Life-saving Care from Cardiac Care Unit

Saturday, May 7, 2022 was a routine day for Aaron Theaker. The 44-year-old Regina man was attending a race event at Kings Park Speedway, just north of the city, with his wife Tenille. However, the day's routine was shaken when Aaron suffered heart failure and required emergency medical care.

Fortunately, a pair of off-duty nurses leapt into action, administering CPR while waiting for the ambulance crew to arrive on the scene. Once they arrived, the EMTs quickly hooked Aaron up to the portable LUCAS chest compression system in the ambulance, which provides mechanical chest compressions to patients in cardiac arrest.

Aaron was rushed to Regina's General Hospital and the exceptional Cardiac Care Unit at the Mosaic Heart Centre. Although the cardiac team was unable to determine the exact cause of his heart failure, our electrophysiologist, Dr. Omar Sultan, a cardiologist who specializes in the heart's electrical system, inserted a pacemaker to control Aaron's heartbeat. He spent a week in the hospital and is back to normal, working and enjoying his life.

"It's amazing how everything seemed to fall into place," Aaron said. "If those nurses weren't at the track that day. If the EMTs didn't have the LUCAS machine. If we didn't have the amazing team at the Mosaic Heart Centre and the cutting-edge technology they use, I simply wouldn't be here today."

cardiac care for the people of southern Saskatchewan," says Lisa Green, senior vice-president, Hospitals of Regina Foundation. "Thanks to the generous support of our donors and partners like Mosaic, we're ensuring that the best level of care is available right here at home, when people need it most."

CP Rail Supports Local Cardiac Care

Heart disease is the second leading cause of death after cancer in Canada, and is one of the leading causes of hospitalization with an estimated 35,000 cardiac arrests occurring in Canada each year. Many patients unfortunately do not survive a heart attack, but studies have shown that survival rates double if CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) and defibrillation occur during the initial crucial moments of the emergency.

Last year, EMS teams in southern Saskatchewan traveled over 780,000 km, bringing more than 10,000 patients to Regina General Hospital, many in need of cardiac care. High quality CPR provided by EMS teams, with minimal interruptions and early defibrillation, are critical to good cardiac resuscitation outcomes. However, CPR is a physically demanding activity and paramedics must exchange positions every two minutes to ensure consistent chest compressions and to reduce potential injuries to themselves.

Last year, Hospitals of Regina Foundation invested \$85,000, including a generous \$25,000 from CP Rail, in five LUCAS chest compression systems for our EMS teams. This technology allows our paramedics to provide consistent high quality CPR and gives them the ability to defibrillate a patient while the device is providing the chest compressions. This helps reduce the interruptions to CPR


and ensures the patient receives the cardiac care they need to survive the journey to our hospital.

"The Foundation is grateful for Canadian Pacific's generous gift of \$25,000, and all cardiac donations from our donors in support of this life saving technology," says Dino Sophocleous, president and CEO, Hospitals of Regina Foundation. "Partners like CP help the Foundation invest in the technology our EMS teams need to provide the best care possible for our southern Saskatchewan community."






