

Foundation Commits Over \$2.4 Million to New Regina Urgent Care Centre



New Regina Urgent Care Centre

In a groundbreaking move that will redefine health care accessibility in Regina, the impending completion and opening of the brand new Regina Urgent Care Centre, on Albert Street North, is set to provide a significant boost to our health care system.

Poised to open its doors in summer 2024, and located right in the heart of our city, Regina's Urgent Care Centre will provide a 24/7 health care option for people who need help for an illness or injury that is not life-threatening but cannot wait until the next day.



Hospitals of Regina Foundation has committed over \$2.4 million to invest in the technology and equipment needs of the Urgent Care Centre, including a digital x-ray system, ultrasound systems, a pharmacy dispensing system and laboratory equipment, as well as the furniture, fixtures and other essential items.

The brand-new, multi-faceted facility will have 22 patient treatment spaces to provide various services, all under one roof. Within our new Urgent Care Centre, patients will be able to receive x-rays, ultrasound imaging, and blood tests, as well as a limited range of prescriptions from the pharmacy located directly on site. Depending on the situation, having these multiple services

available in one facility may allow patients to receive all the care they need in one visit.

Another feature of this all-encompassing approach to health care is a dedicated area for those needing care due to urgent mental health or addiction issues. In addition to physicians and registered nurses, patients will have access to specialized clinical counselors, social workers, and mental health care and addiction workers to receive timely and coordinated care. Regina's Urgent Care Centre will be the only one in Canada to have this dedicated space for mental health care as an integral part of the new centre.

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The Saskatchewan Health Authority estimates that the Urgent Care Centre's staff will care for 20,000 patients in the first year, including approximately 2,000 people seeking urgent mental health and addictions care.

With over 100,000 patients seeking care in Regina's Emergency Departments every year, this added capacity to care for urgent health care issues will relieve some of the pressure on the medical teams at the Regina General Hospital and Pasqua Hospital Emergency Departments. Our new Urgent Care Centre will serve as an intermediary option for those suffering from urgent, but non-life-threatening illnesses or injuries that may not require an emergency room visit. The resulting decrease in the demand and wait times for care in Regina's emergency rooms is

a positive step towards improving the overall patient experience while also allowing those resources to be available for life-threatening medical emergencies.

An additional benefit will be for ambulance paramedics and those in our community needing their help.
Currently, if an ambulance brings a patient to the Emergency Department, the paramedic team must stay with the patient until the ER staff are ready to see them. If the Emergency Department is particularly busy, and the patient doesn't have a life-threatening condition, the paramedics may have to stay with the patient for several hours. This means the ambulance and its crew are not available to help other patients in need.

The Regina Urgent Care Centre will help reduce wait times, improve the overall patient experience, get ambulance paramedics back into circulation more quickly and connect people to the follow up care they need in their community.

Diagnostic imaging is an important component of modern medical care; it provides critical information that doctors need to diagnose, treat and monitor injuries and disease. Regina's new Urgent Care Centre will have a dedicated X-ray system to help our medical teams provide the best care possible to patients, thanks to a generous gift of more than \$305,000 from the Kinsmen Foundation.

X-rays are images produced by exposing a portion of the body to a small dose of ionizing radiation, creating a twodimensional picture used by our medical teams to investigate many medical problems, including broken bones and dislocated joints, or locating foreign materials, infections, heart problems and more.

The X-ray system, combined with an ultrasound system, an on-site laboratory and dedicated pharmacy services, will help our Urgent Care Centre medical teams provide enhanced medical care to our southern Saskatchewan community.

Young Diabetes Patient Overcomes All Obstacles Thanks to Regind's Hospitals

Hartley Halvorson was a typical twoyear-old, without a care in the world. However, all of that changed on September 26, 2018. That's the day a blood test confirmed a diagnosis of type 1 diabetes for the Regina youngster.

"We were floored, honestly," says
Hartley's dad Dustin. "In hindsight, the
signs were there. For a few weeks, she
had been playing less. Wanting to be
carried instead of walking. This was
combined with being a bit moody and
getting upset quite easily. She was
wetting through her diapers at night
and was craving water. She was really
thirsty, yet peeing so much."

Once Hartley's diagnosis was confirmed, she began receiving treatment, including insulin injections, at the pediatric inpatient unit at Regina's General Hospital. Initially, Hartley was hospitalized for six days, to get her blood sugar levels down to a safer level and to ensure she was hydrated.

"We were in complete disbelief," Dustin explains. "We eat really healthy, get lots of exercise as a family. We take our vitamins. We did everything to the best of our abilities, so we couldn't understand how this could be happening to us!"

Shock quickly turned to determination, as the Halvorsons worked with Hartley's health care team to develop a long-term strategy.

"I cannot stress enough how amazing Hartley's medical team was," Dustin continues. "We felt so lucky to live in southern Saskatchewan and have access to incredible pediatric care, right here at home. We had no idea what type 1 diabetes was or what we needed to do to keep her healthy. In total, we spent six days at the General. This was not because Hartley was struggling or needing to be in a hospital bed. It had a lot to do with training us how to understand blood sugar levels, insulin dosages for type 1 diabetes for juveniles, and how to perform each task and learn all about diet and carb counting. It was overwhelming."

Today, Hartley is a healthy and happy seven year old. Since diagnosis, Hartley's family and friends have dove into a new mission: increasing awareness of juvenile diabetes and raising much-needed funds for research and treatment. Their efforts have included launching the Hartley's Heroes website, a Facebook page, and supporting fundraising initiatives including Hospitals of Regina Foundation's annual Four Seasons Ball, which supports pediatric health care in Regina's hospitals.

Three Sets of Twins for Family at Regina's Hospitals

You may have seen her shining smile on some of our posters or brochures, but Petrina McArthur is also no stranger to our neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) at the Rawlco Centre for Mother Baby Care, at Regina's General Hospital. As a mother of eight, Petrina has received care from our medical teams on multiple occasions and has always been willing to give back where she can, so naturally she was a perfect fit as a member of our Hospitals of Regina Foundation Community.

Back in 2016, when Petrina discovered she would be having her first set of twins, she was already the mother of two single-birth children, Alice (now seven) and Paeteaus (now nine). Within a year of the twins' birth, the family would be in for yet another surprise, as she found out that she was once again expecting twins. "Having one set of twins was a surprise in itself, but discovering we were to have another set was absolutely crazy," Petrina recalls.

Four new babies in just over two years was a huge addition for the family and

trying to manage six young kids can be a handful so, when Petrina got the news that she was pregnant and expecting a third set of twins, it caused a whirlwind of emotions within the family. "It was certainly overwhelming to receive that news, and it took me quite a while to really embrace it," Petrina tells us. While the odds of having twins can increase after the first set, having three sets of naturally conceived twins is quite uncommon.

The third set of twins, Felix and Francine, were both born prematurely on November 30, 2021 at just over thirty-two weeks. As a result, they needed a precautionary two-week stay in our NICU. Under the watchful eye of the amazing staff in the NICU, Felix and Francine successfully met their developmental milestones and were able to go home to meet their family on December 17, 2021.

"I honestly can't thank the doctors and nurses enough for the care they've shown me over the years. I am originally from Pheasant Rump First Nation but all of my children were born here, in Regina's General Hospital. The staff in the NICU are truly remarkable. Not only do they take care of the babies, but the way they care for the families is really special as well. They made my stressful situation so much easier, and for that, I will be forever thankful."

"Stories like Petrina's exemplify why we must continue to invest in life-saving technology and equipment for our NICU," says Dino Sophocleous, president and CEO, Hospitals of Regina Foundation.
