A Tense Beginning Leads to Seven Years (and counting) Of Good Luck for Regina Family

In April of 2014, Amy Bucsis' pregnancy was going according to plan. At least it was, until Amy's doctor told her the baby needed to be delivered by C-section two and a half weeks ahead of her due date. Fortunately, Amy and her husband Russ had our world-class medical team in the Rawlco Centre for Mother Baby Care at Regina's General Hospital (RGH) to count on.

"During a routine ultrasound on April 8, they explained to me that my baby wasn't moving much." says Amy. "She had stopped growing and she needed to be delivered ASAP. The next day, I was at RGH and Terra was born by C-section a short time later."

Tiny Terra arrived in the world weighing a bit under 4.5 pounds. Amy and Russ spent a few moments with her before she was taken by the medical team to our Special Care Nursery, a part of our NICU for babies who are still premature but need less critical care.

"Terra's situation wasn't necessarily a matter of life and death," Amy acknowledges. "However, when it's your first child, and she is so small and frail, it

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can be very scary. Fortunately, the medical staff was fantastic, taking the time to answer all our questions and calm our nerves. That helped a lot."

Terra stayed in the Special Care Nursery for ten days, until her doctor decided she had grown strong enough to go home. Today, she's healthy and strong, living the life of a typical seven-year-old. She's doing very well in school, and enjoys activities including gymnastics and swimming lessons.

"Our family is just so grateful for the Rawlco Centre for Mother Baby Care." Amy says. "I can't even imagine how stressful it would have been to have to travel further away. We're also thankful for all of the Hospitals of Regina Foundation donors. Their support gives our medical teams access to the best available technology and equipment, which is literally saving lives."

Last year, 28 children from southern Saskatchewan were diagnosed with cancer and 160 were actively receiving cancer treatment or follow up care.

Childhood cancer is relatively rare, but when it happens it can be lifethreatening. During what is a scary time for children and parents alike, being close to home while receiving treatment is of paramount importance!

Regina's new children's cancer clinic will be built beside our pediatric inpatient unit at Regina General Hospital and will help families from all over the southern half of the province. It will include a family-friendly reception area and six infusion bays in an open environment for the delivery of chemotherapy or other treatments. The infusion bays will have a clear line of site to the nurse's station for careful monitoring of the children. The clinic will also provide coordinated follow up care. An estimated two-thirds of childhood cancer survivors will have at least one chronic or long-term side effect from their cancer treatment. This usually means regular monitoring by pediatric specialists. The whole family will benefit from a welcoming and coordinated approach to supporting their child as they battle their illness.

When 91-year-old Irene Piasta of Regina passed away last year after a brief battle with cancer, her daughter Linda lost more than a mother. "She was my best friend, my companion," Linda explains. "We used to phone each other four times a day. Losing my mom is like losing a huge piece of my heart."

Irene started experiencing back pain around Christmas, 2020. By March, the pain had increased to the point where she was taken by ambulance to Regina's Pasqua Hospital. That's when a diagnosis of cancer was confirmed.

"We don't even know how widespread the cancer was," Linda states. "She didn't want any treatment, no diagnostic tests, nothing. She just wanted to go out on her own terms, as comfortable and pain free as possible."

After a short stint in an assisted living facility, Irene returned to Pasqua Hospital in May 2021, this time entering the Palliative Care Unit.

Palliative Care Provides Comfort for Regina Family

"Mom passed away a couple of weeks later," Linda says. "But I'm so grateful for the time she had in palliative care. Honestly, the nurses and all the staff there are amazing. I describe them as angels. The work they do in providing care and comfort to terminally ill people and their families is just incredible."

Every year, many families in Regina and southern Saskatchewan are faced with the emotional and physical challenges of a loved one with terminal illness or severely life limiting conditions. Our palliative care program provides much needed comfort and care for these patients during the final stages of life. It also empowers their families to assist in their care, to prepare for and cope with the death of their loved ones, and to ultimately heal and re-join an active life in the community.

Thanks to a generous \$110,000 commitment from RBC Foundation in 2020 and 2021, the Foundation was able to make important investments in the priority needs of the Palliative Care In-Patient Unit at Pasqua Hospital, as well as Palliative Homecare Services. The investments in equipment such as slings, lifts, and air mattresses will be used every day to help patients and families.

Our digestive system is central to our body's ability to digest food, absorb nutrients and eliminate waste. Problems with this body system impact our overall health, can dramatically decrease our quality of life and, in some instances, may even be fatal.

Hospitals of Regina Foundation is investing \$1.7 million in our Gastrointestinal (GI) Unit at Pasqua Hospital to replace a specialized imaging system and other equipment which will help our specialists provide the best care possible. In a typical year, our GI specialists see more than 14,000 people and perform more than 12,000 procedures to save lives and improve quality of life.

Thousands of people from across the province are referred here each year.



World-class Cardiac Care

Gives Local Man a New Lease on Life

When Don Brooks talks about his experience in our Cardiac Care Unit (CCU) at Regina General Hospital (RGH), he can't help but be unrestrained in his praise for the unit and the staff who work there. If not for them, he knows he likely would not be here today.

On February 28, 2016, Don encountered difficulty breathing while at home in east Regina. He was rushed to RGH, where he was diagnosed with a pulmonary edema, a condition caused by excess fluid in the lungs as a result of the problems with his heart. Our cardiologists needed to insert a couple of stents into Don's blood vessels that same night, to clear up blockages. Over the course of the next eight months, he suffered two more pulmonary edema episodes, requiring the insertion of more stents and a pacemaker to regulate his heartbeat.

"I have to say, everyone at the CCU did a fantastic job throughout the process," Don said. "I owe them everything. Thanks to them, I was able to celebrate my 65th birthday, in February 2022, with my 93-year-old dad and other family members. That's a gift I'll never be able to repay."

"Don's story is an important reminder of how fortunate we are to have the CCU at the Mosaic Heart Centre in our community," says Lisa Green, senior vice-president, Hospitals of Regina Foundation. "With the help of our donors, we are committed to supporting excellent cardiac care by investing in the best technology and equipment available, so our cardiac teams can help people like Don live better lives."
