The need for trauma care can happen at any moment. It could be the result of a vehicle collision on a busy highway, a head injury at a sporting event, a farm accident, or even a significant fall at home.

Trauma cases impact all services in our hospitals. The demand on Regina's hospital emergency departments, surgical, intensive care and medical units continues to grow. In 2016 alone, the Regina General and Pasqua Hospitals saw 1,547 serious trauma care cases. That is more than four per day. It is vital that we ensure our doctors and nurses are equipped with the technology they need to provide life-saving care to those in critical need. A renewed partnership between Hospitals of Regina Foundation (HRF) and GMS will help pave the way for improved trauma care in Regina's hospitals. The Foundation recently launched its Trauma Care Campaign, and in support of the campaign, GMS stepped up to pledge a \$1 million match for all donations from the community. This exceptional commitment means every donation will have twice the impact.

With your help, the Foundation is committed to raising \$3 million to support the Trauma Care Campaign. Funds raised will support the purchase of life-saving equipment and technology in all areas of our hospitals, ultimately helping people live better lives. "Life can change in the blink of an eye. Regina's hospitals have made Michael Deren's life better

Having access to quality health care services is critically important, no matter where you live. Michael Deren is proof of that. The Lampman, Saskatchewan resident continues to benefit from the exceptional care provided by Regina's hospitals.

"In a province with a little more than a million people, it is not feasible, or realistic, to have health care services available in every community," says Michael. "We must focus on our major hospitals and ensure they are equipped to provide patients with the care they deserve. My family and I don't have health care without Regina's hospitals."

For more than 50 years, Michael's medical needs have touched a number of key services within our hospitals, including the emergency department, trauma and cardiac care, and surgical and medicine units. In addition, his wife, Georgina, is a patient at the GMS Cardiac Rhythm Device Clinic at the Regina General Hospital, his daughter has received neurological care at the Pasqua Hospital, and one of his granddaughters spent 19 days in the neonatal intensive care unit.

"Regina's hospitals have always been there for us when we needed them, much like a loving mother. They are always there for you, without fail," he says. "Over the years, we have had health problems, some more challenging than others. Whenever we have required specialized care and the support of physicians, Regina's hospitals have been there." Based on his experiences, Michael has seen firsthand how Hospitals of Regina Foundation and its donors have elevated the level of care provided to patients.

Michael and Georgina have done their part to give back too, supporting key areas of care such as the Mosaic Heart Centre, the Eye Centre and cancer care. They have also chosen to donate in thoughtful and creative ways. In recent years, the couple has made tribute gifts for Christmas to the Foundation in honour of each of their five children.

"Giving tribute gifts is our way of honouring our children, while supporting Regina's hospitals at the same time," says Michael. "We know they appreciate it far beyond anything else we could have gotten them."

Michael shares that same appreciation for the continued work of the Foundation and those who choose to support the organization. He believes we all have a role to play in not only meeting, but exceeding, the expectations of the community and those who require care at Regina's hospitals.

"If you live in a small rural community and need life-saving care, there's a significant chance you will use one of three Regina hospitals," he says. "Any funds we raise can help fill in the blanks so that our hospitals are well equipped to provide our friends, family members, and neighbours with quality care." 

By honouring its veterans, the Royal Canadian Legion Regina Branch 001 is helping change the future of health care in southern Saskatchewan.

In 2017, the organization provided a generous gift of \$100,000 to Hospitals of Regina Foundation as part of its Poppy Campaign. The annual campaign generates funds from the sale of poppies and wreaths leading up to, and including, Remembrance Day services in the community.

The funds will support the Veterans Unit at the Wascana Rehabilitation Centre and the Eye Centre at the Pasqua Hospital, and will be invested in much-needed equipment and technology for both areas of care.

"I couldn't be more proud of what we have accomplished over the years," says Ken Eskdale, president and comrade. "Our partnership with the Foundation speaks to the pride of our veterans and their desire to give back. Our commitment to this country begins with serving the people and causes that drive our communities."

Comrade Ian Brown, chair of the Poppy Campaign, agrees that the success of the campaign has been impressive.

"The Poppy Campaign gets better and better every year," says Ian. "It is heartwarming to see how the people of southern Saskatchewan have embraced such an important cause. It means a great deal to us to be able to give back to organizations like Hospitals of Regina Foundation."

The Royal Canadian Legion Regina Branch 001 is a long-standing supporter of the Foundation. Over the past 29 years, the organization has donated more than \$444,000 to support health care services in our hospitals, including electric beds, patient lifts, and eye diagnostic and treatment equipment.

Lisa Chamberlin, director of care, extended care and veterans programs at the Wascana Rehabilitation Centre, says the impact of the Royal Canadian Legion Regina Branch 001 has been tremendous.

Uncover the Cure marks 10 years with significant milestone

What began as the vision of two local businessmen is now helping men in our community live better lives.

Gordon and Doug Rawlinson, founders of Rawlco Radio, sought to change the future of health care in southern Saskatchewan. That vision became a reality in 1987 with the launch of the Z99 Radiothon and the donation of a major financial gift to the Rawlco Centre for Mother Baby Care, 17 years later.

In 2007, Rawlco turned its attention to improving men's health care in our community by creating the Uncover the Cure Cocktail Party. The event was designed to raise funds to help establish the Prostate Assessment Centre at the Pasqua Hospital. Through Hospitals of Regina Foundation, the funds would be invested in state-of-the-art equipment and technology.

In 2017, the event celebrated its 10th anniversary by raising \$82,900, bringing its 10-year total to more than \$1 million.

"We can't say enough about the support Uncover the Cure has received over the past 10 years," says Tom Newton, vice president and general manager of Rawlco Radio. "Each year, the community has stepped up and affirmed its support for men's health care. Together, we are helping ensure that our fathers, brothers and sons receive the best health care possible, right here at home."

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer affecting men. One in eight men are diagnosed every year. The Prostate Assessment Centre plays a critical role in providing patients with early detection, diagnosis and treatment. Last year alone, 534 men received biopsies at the Centre.

Steve Pillipow, a prostate cancer survivor and a current advisor with the prostate cancer support group, says Uncover the Cure has played a critical role in keeping men's health care top of mind in our community.

"The opening of the Prostate Assessment Centre was a defining moment for men's health care in southern Saskatchewan," says Steve. "Thanks to Rawlco, Hospitals of Regina Foundation and events like Uncover the Cure, we have an assessment centre that will continue to make lives better."

"Over the past 10 years, the Prostate Assessment Centre has become a key centre for men's health care in southern Saskatchewan. The Foundation's ability to provide patients with timely, effective diagnosis and treatment is possible because of partners like Rawlco, our donors, and events such as Uncover the Cure," says Dino Sophocleous, president and CEO, Hospitals of Regina Foundation. "Thanks to events like this, men in our community are living better lives. We are extremely grateful for all the hard work Rawlco puts into the event, and would like to congratulate them on this impressive \$1 million milestone."

Gifts that will make lives better

Each year, people in our community direct heartfelt gifts to Hospitals of Regina Foundation (HRF) in honour of a loved one. Often times, these thoughtful donations symbolize a deep appreciation for the exceptional care provided at Regina's hospitals – like that of Norman Beirnes.

Norman's wife, Joan, received tremendous care at our hospitals that extended her quality of life for five-anda-half years before her passing in 2010. To show his gratitude and to help others, Norman donates a gift of securities to the Foundation every year. The retired University of Regina mathematics professor is also an HRF Legacy Society member who wants to help make lives better by leaving a gift to the Foundation in his will.

"My wife and I were fortunate to have accumulated a number of stocks over

the course of our careers. We were planning to enjoy a long retirement, but that all changed after she grew very ill," says Norman. "She often said she wanted to give back, with Hospitals of Regina Foundation being top of mind. I can think of no better way to show my appreciation for the care she received than to help improve the health care services available for others at Regina's hospitals."

Making a gift of securities to the Foundation has an immediate impact on the care provided in Regina's three hospitals. Donating publicly traded securities like stocks, bonds and mutual funds eliminates the capital gains tax that you would pay if you sold the securities and then submitted a cheque to donate the funds.

Considering this, Norman believes a gift of securities is the perfect way to help

support family members, friends and neighbours who receive care at our hospitals.

"Donating securities gives me the flexibility to decide when I want to give back, and how much I choose to contribute," says Norman. "Admittedly, the tax incentives are why I make the gift in this way – no one wants to pay any more taxes than they need to – but the real benefit is in knowing I am helping others in our community. I know Joan would be very happy about that."

"Norman has shown how donating a gift of securities is a simple process with a very positive outcome," says Lisa Green, HRF's vice president of development. "Each year, he reviews his portfolio to determine the stocks that may have the largest capital gain. He then contacts his broker and notifies the Foundation when he has made the transaction. It is a triple win for everyone involved – contributing to better health care, eliminating capital gains tax, and receiving a charitable tax receipt."

"Being a nurse at the Regina General Hospital, I have seen firsthand just how important the proceeds from the home lotteries are," says Motunrayo. "By purchasing a ticket, we help ensure my colleagues and I have the technology we need to provide life-saving care to those in need."

In 2017, we marked an important milestone in the history of our Foundation and the Home Lottery. For 30 years, the people of Saskatchewan have generously supported our lotteries, raising much-needed funds for health care services at Regina's three hospitals. Since 1987, proceeds from our lottery program have totalled more than an astounding \$39 million.

The 2017 Spring Home Lottery built on that momentum, selling out before the early bird deadline. There were 1,505 prizes awarded and the 50/50 add-on reached nearly \$772,000.

For Motunrayo, like many of our lottery winners, the ability to give back and make lives better is what matters most. The mother of five and grandmother of three has purchased tickets for the past seven years, and will continue to do so in the future.

"It makes me happy to spend my money on such a great cause. Supporting the home lotteries is another way for me to help make lives better for people in our community," she says. "It is a win-win situation for me and my family. If I win a prize, great! If not, I still win because I know I am doing my part to improve the health care services available to our people."

President and CEO Dino Sophocleous says Motunrayo is an example of the philanthropic spirit that makes our community special.

"As we celebrate the 30th anniversary of the Foundation's Home Lotteries, we thank the southern Saskatchewan community for their unwavering support, generosity and dedication to enhancing the lives of people you care about," he says. Celebrating 30 years of making lives better

When Phyllis Lamb began supporting Hospitals of Regina Foundation (HRF), Brian Mulroney was Canada's Prime Minister. *Cheers* was one of television's top rated programs. And, the Saskatchewan Roughriders welcomed to their team the young quarterback Kent Austin. Fast forward 30 years, and the only constant is Lamb's commitment to Regina's hospitals.

Lamb made her first gift in 1986, one year before the Foundation was formed. Since then, she donated generously to help fill the greatest needs in Regina's three hospitals. Over the past 30 years, she made a total of 59 donations.

"Sooner or later, we all need hospital care," says Lamb. "I don't know of any other charitable organization that helps so many people. I don't have children, so I want to do my part to help the community. It's nice to think you are able to do something good for other people."

That same commitment to community is what first drove brothers Gordon and

Doug Rawlinson to give back. In 1987, the founders of Rawlco Radio forever changed the face of health care in southern Saskatchewan with the launch of the Z99 Radiothon. Since then, the annual 36-hour fundraising event has raised more than \$7 million for the Foundation to invest in life-saving technology for the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) at the Regina General Hospital.

"Gordon and Doug care deeply about this community and its people," says Tom Newton, vice president and general manager of Rawlco Radio. He says for 30 years, the entire Rawlco Radio family has worked with the Foundation to build on that legacy by encouraging the community to open their hearts and donate, and each year they have responded with great generosity. "We are proud to have made such a positive impact on the many babies requiring Regina's NICU."

SaskTel's on-going generosity has also led to better lives for people in our community. Beginning in 1987, the Corporation partnered with the Foundation to invest in improved health care services in many key areas. This includes, bringing the first MRI machine to southern Saskatchewan in 1999, the Prostate Assessment Centre, and the Mosaic Heart Centre.

"SaskTel is dedicated to supporting the communities we serve and improving the quality of life in our province," says Katrine White, SaskTel vice president, consumer sales and solutions, and current HRF board member. "Health care is an essential service in Saskatchewan, and SaskTel has been supporting Hospitals of Regina Foundation since 1987 to allow the Corporation to demonstrate its commitment to the people of this province."
